III. Child Abuse Prevention Program Procurement Process and Recommendations for Funding Supervisor Hopkins arrived at this time.

Regina de Melo, Program Manager at Human Services Department, Family-Youth-and Children Division presented on recommendations for funding.

Ms. de Melo shared information on the Children's Trust Fund (CTF):

- CTF locally established by Board of Supervisors in 1983 in response to Assembly Bill
 2994
- Funding received through vehicle license and birth certificate fees and private contributions
- Purpose is to fund child abuse and neglect prevention and intervention programs targeting at-risk populations
- Locally using \$183,000 in CTF funds as part of a total budget of \$671,000 for prevention services provided to families diverted from Child Welfare Services

CTF Commission –Advisory Role

- CTF Commission designated to act in an advisory capacity to the Board on funding decisions related to the Sonoma County Children's Trust Fund
- Collaborative effort of First 5/CTF Commissions and Human Services Department

Sonoma County Child Welfare 2018 Data

- 2,400 incidents of suspected child abuse were investigated
- 502 of those were substantiated allegations
- 236 children were placed in foster care for the first time because they weren't safe at home

- 135 children returned to their families once their homes were safe, after an average of 283 days in care
- 51 children were adopted by forever families

Child Welfare for Age 0-5 Population

146 Children ages 0-5 were placed in foster care:

- 71% had Substance Abuse in the home
- o 36% had Domestic Violence in the home
- 23% had parental mental illness as a contributing factor
- o 5% were a victim or at risk of sexual abuse

38% of these children were under the age of one:

45% of children under one tested positive for drugs/alcohol at birth

The CAPS Program Serves:

- Families involved in a child welfare investigation where children are not removed from the home
- In 2018:
 - 286 families referred to CAPS prevention services
 - o Families offered parenting, housing, therapy, nursing support, resource assistance

Evaluation Findings

- 33% Engagement
- Most families met their Program Goals
- No impact on re-allegation rates
- Some impact on Protective Factors

CAPS Program Re-Design

- Focus on engagement
- Evidence-Based and Trauma-Informed Services
- Service Areas include Parent Education, Therapy and Resource Assistance
- Child Abuse Prevention Council is key in bringing community-wide prevention efforts

Contracted Services

- Child Parent Institute Engagement, Resource Assistance and Parent Education for \$465,000; Child Abuse Prevention Council for \$48,000
- Therapeutic Services Contracts with LifeWorks, Verity and YWCA \$158,000

Committee Member Murray recommended more long term tracking of families, longer than 18 months.

Staff recommendation: Accept Children's Trust Fund Advisory Committee recommendation of Contracted Services to the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors.
